At the January meeting John Rawlins talked about the village events of 1930 - births, deaths and marriages, court cases and sporting fixtures including baseball at Ascott.

The year saw the arrival of a new sewer system for Milton and Shipton which followed the installation of mains electricity the previous year. In 1930 secondary education was re-structured and there were proposals for new Council Houses. In an essentially agricultural environment Oxfordshire's road fatalities were as numerous as those in 1996.

David Morton stepped in at a day's notice to speak at the February meeting on Canal Bridges. Prior to canals there were only river bridges, but as the canals spread so more bridges, aqueducts and viaducts were created, plus the introduction of tunnels. The canals fell into decline when they were superseded by the railways which often followed routes of the canals so a new generation of canal bridges appeared. A century later, some of the railway system closed and some bridges were abandoned but motorway bridges were added to the fascinating collection of canal bridges.
