#### **Note.**

For those who are unfamiliar with E(lectronic)-mail, it is simply a method of sending mail from one computer to one or hundreds of computers anywhere in the world. The letter is typed on a computer, then sent over a fixed transatlantic phone line to Vienna, U.S.A. where it is stored in a 'gynormous' computer. When the intended recipient "logs on" with their computer, the letter is soon on the monitor screen to be printed, saved or deleted as required. All this for less than the cost of a stamp! And it's much quicker than ordinary 'snail mail', from almost instantaneously to maybe a little longer. It is also vastly cheaper and quicker than a 'fax'.
