Last year, several thousand people in the United Kingdom, mostly elderly, died from Winter flu. This year, the Government has reduced the age limit for the flu vaccine from 75 to 65. It is recommended therefore that everybody above this age should seek vaccination when the clinics are held at the Surgery in October and November.

In addition to the age criteria, it should also be remembered that all asthmatics, Diabetics and those with chronic respiratory or heart problems should also seek vaccination. Information as to the times and arrangements for the vaccination clinics will be posted in the Surgery and on local notice boards and we would strongly recommend that anybody within the detailed categories should avail themselves of this jab.
