Much of the success of the Roseneath **School of Music** is due to the fact that I wasn't a musical prodigy and that I had to engage in a great deal of selfeducation, much of it in my own time. two children permitting! Every pupil of the Roseneath School of Music is taken through a clearly constructed course of tuition, modified to individual needs and pace of learning. Even the youngest student can engage in a programme of attractive pieces and

begin upon a course of written tasks.

Most pupils start around the age of six and there is no upper age limit. In the mornings several adults come to my home for their lessons and once the school day is over I teach children and adults at Burford School and the Tiddy Hall, Ascott and also travel to Enstone and Idbury. On Tuesdays and Thursdays I am based at home in Witney.

This is awarded annually to the best pianist from the local primary School at a level at or below Grade 5
