SWych Hosts Energy Forum

Is your home as energy-efficient as it can be? How would you know?

With fuel prices rising disproportionately to incomes and nearly one in five of UK households falling into the government's 'fuel poverty' category, it's essential that we know about conserving fuel and reducing our monthly bills.

A Free Thermal Image of your Home

Without proper insulation, you could be losing up to a quarter of your heat through your roof and a third of your heat could be escaping through your walls. Cold air can be coming in through doors and windows which you think are draught proof and unlagged pipes and water tanks add to the cost of heating your water. In February and March 2012, members of Sustainable Wychwoods (SWych) in conjunction with West Oxfordshire District Council, will be undertaking a survey of local domestic properties by offering householders the opportunity to commission a free thermal image of their home highlighting the areas where heat is escaping or cold air is entering.

Prior to the survey, on Saturday, the 21st of January from 3 - 5pm, SWych will be hosting an Energy Forum at the New Beaconsfield Hall in Shipton-under-Wychwood. This open public meeting will feature presentations which will include all the following; energy efficiency measures for your home, eligibility for government-backed grants and offers, upgrading social housing, investing in renewables such as solar PV and solar thermal, the Thermal Imaging Project and the newly-installed solar farm in Shipton.
